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Dear Members:

Summer is here and the number one area of attention should be lake safety for all of us. The rules have changed since last year in two critical areas. First, every powered watercraft must have a “member” on board. Second, member children over the age of 13 and born after September 1, 1993 must have passed an approved water safety course and the certificate must be on the jet ski to be able to operate it without an adult on board. Please make sure to review the Rules and Ordinances on our website before an “issue” develops.

The fireworks will be held on July 3rd, so mark your calendars.

We continue to be acutely aware of the Zika virus developments, particularly now that we have been getting rain. The following is current as of this writing:

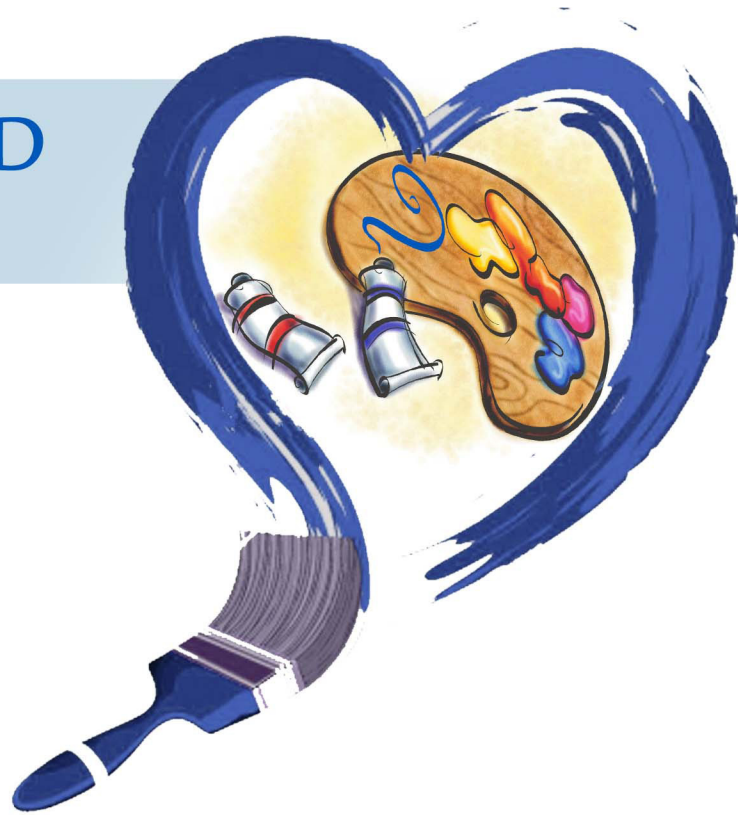

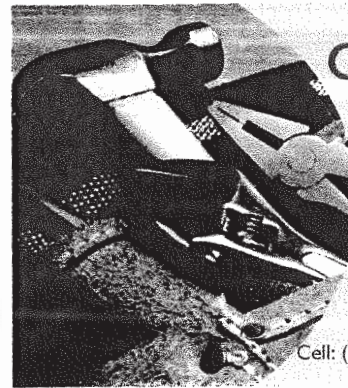

FICTION

THE WIDOW, by Fiona Barton. When the police started asking questions, Jean Taylor turned into a different woman. One who enabled herself and her husband to carry on when more bad things began to happen, but that woman's husband died last week. And Jean doesn't have to be her anymore.

EVERYONE BRAVE IS FORGIVEN, by Chris Cleave. In London in the early days of WWII, three lives are entangled in violence and passion, friendship and deception, inexorably shaping their hopes and dreams.

THE GANGSTER, by Clive Cussler. In 1906 New York City, the Italian crime group known as the Black Hand is on a spree: kidnapping, extortion, arson. Detective Isaac Bell of the Van Dorn Agency is hired to form a special "Black Hand Squad." And then the murders begin.

SLOW BURN, by Robert B. Parker. Three firefighters are killed fighting a fast-moving fire in a boarded-up Catholic church. Firefighter Jack McGee lost his best friend in the blaze, and he's convinced it's not arson. He takes his case to Spenser.

REDEMPTION ROAD, by John Hart. A boy with a gun waits for the man who killed his mother. A troubled detective confronts her past after a brutal shooting. After 13 years in prison, a good cop walks free. And deep in the forest, on the altar of an abandoned church, the unthinkable has just happened. This is a town on the brink. This is a road with no mercy.

EXTREME PREY, by John Sanford. Lucas Davenport, no longer employed by the Minnesota BCA, is invited by his friend the governor to join his presidential campaign staff. It's a fun gig, until they find they have a shadow: an armed man intent on killing the governor and anyone who gets in his way.

NON FICTION

THE RAINBOW COMES AND GOES, Anderson Cooper and Gloria Vanderbilt. A charming and intimate collection of correspondence between journalist Anderson Cooper and his mother, celebrity socialite Gloria Vanderbilt. After she fell briefly ill, the two began a conversation through email in which they discussed their lives, what matters to them, and what they still want to learn about each other. An appealing blend of memoir and inspirational advice.

VALIANT AMBITION, by Nathaniel Philbrick. A surprising account of the middle years of the American Revolution and the tragic relationship between George Washington and one of his favorite generals, Benedict Arnold. By war's end Arnold had fled to the enemy after a foiled attempt to surrender West Point to the British.

AUDIO

TRIGGER WARNING, by Neil Gaiman. A rich cornucopia of horror and ghost stories, science fiction and fairy tales, fabulism and poetry that explores the realm of experience and emotion. Includes the special Doctor Who 50th anniversary story, A Calendar of Tales, Adventure Story, Click-Clack the Rattlebag, The Case of Death and Honey, the new tale Black Dog, and more.

HOUSE OF THE RISING SUN, by James Lee Burke. In 1918, after a violent encounter that leaves four Mexican soldiers dead, Texas Ranger Hackberry Holland escapes with a stolen artifact. In return, a bloodthirsty Austrian arms dealer places Hack's son, Army Captain Ishmael Hackberry, directly in the cross hairs of a plot to recapture his prize.

RISEN, by Angela Hunt. Roman Tribune Clavius is assigned by Pilate to keep the radical followers of the recently executed Yeshua from stealing the body and inciting revolution. When the body goes missing, Clavius's investigation leads him from the halls of Herod to the Garden of Gethsemane and brings him in touch with believer and doubter alike.

LUCKIEST GIRL ALIVE, by Jessica Knoll. A young woman strives to create the perfect life – husband, home, career – until a violent incident from her past threatens to unravel everything and expose her most shocking secret of all.

LAST OF THE PRESIDENT'S MEN, by Bob Woodward. Journalist Bob Woodward exposes one of the final pieces of the Richard Nixon puzzle with the story of Alexander Butterfield, a White House aide during Nixon's administration. In 1973, he revealed during the Watergate hearings in the Senate that President Nixon had been taping his Oval Office conversations. Uncovers new dimensions of Nixon's secrets, obsessions, and deception.

Village ordinance requires all construction projects to obtain a building permit prior to beginning construction within the LT boundaries. Failure to obtain a permit may result in a substantial fine.

To obtain a BUILDING PERMIT, you must submit a BUILDING PERMIT APPLICATION. Building Permit Applications are available at the Village Hall, Lake Tanglewood Corporation Office, or online at www.laketanglewood.org

BUILDING PERMIT APPLICATIONS must be submitted one week before the next Building Committee Meeting. Meetings are held on Wednesday, 5:30pm at Village Hall.

Village Notes

Mark your calendars for the **July 4th Weekend**. Weather permitting, our **annual fireworks will be at sunset on July 3rd**. The **parade and picnic will be July 4th**.

During the July 4th weekend, the village experiences a significant influx of residents and guests. July 3rd (fireworks day) is especially challenging, as traffic gets backed up at the gate for a quarter of a mile or more at its peak. It is especially important to be safety conscious during this weekend and all summer. Some reminders for July 4th weekend:

1. **Be patient at the gate.** The guards do their best to process visitors as quickly as possible.
2. **Be extra cautious while driving.** Our streets have many hazards (golf carts, bikes, skate boards, pedestrians, pets, deer and turkeys). They are also narrow and congested.
3. **Don't allow guests to park so as to block traffic.** The streets need to be clear for traffic and emergency vehicle travel. Vehicles parked so as to impede traffic will be ticketed.
4. **Use extra caution while boating.** Our lake gets congested during this weekend.
5. **Members are responsible for their guests.** Please follow the rules and ordinances.
6. **Fireworks are illegal.**

Let's all have a fun filled and safe celebration of our independence as a nation.

Village of Lake Tanglewood Roofing Requirements (2016)

Permits are required for all roofing projects over 100 sq. ft. Residential roofing permits are \$50.00 with one inspection (min.) at \$125.00. (Note: new construction roofing will be included in the new home construction permit. A separate permit is not required).

Roof coverings of asphalt shingle, wood, slate, clay, cement, or asbestos cement tile shall not be installed without first removing all existing layers of roof coverings. An additional layer of those materials on top of an existing layer is not permitted: {see exceptions for complete and separate metal roofing systems in the 2015 International Residential Code}

Wood shakes and shingles shall only be used on solid sheathing.

Required Information on Building Permit Application for Roofing:

- Section I All homeowner's information.
- Section II All contractor's contact and insurance (bonding and liability) information.
- Section III State type of building (main dwelling, detached garage, shed, etc.) and type of roof material (asphalt shingle, wood, etc.). If this is the main dwelling, please indicate if there is an attached garage or any fuel-fired appliances.

Carbon Monoxide Alarms

Carbon Monoxide Alarms are required in dwellings that have attached garages or fuel-fired appliances. A minimum of one (1) CO alarm is required at each sleeping area, outside the bedroom(s). Example: a hallway common to one or more bedroom doorways is considered a sleeping area. It is possible to have a combination smoke and carbon monoxide alarm.

Approved alarms shall be installed in accordance with manufacturer's installation instructions or located on the wall at a height 42 to 90 inches above floor, avoiding locations near heating/cooling vents or areas which provide turbulent airflow, and minimum 36 inches away from openings to areas of high humidity. Avoid installing CO alarms in kitchens or above fuel-burning appliances.

In order to pass the roofing inspection, required CO alarm(s) must be installed.

The Building Committee recommends obtaining the services of a roofing contractor who is licensed with the City of Amarillo or with the City of Canyon. These contractors carry a \$20,000 bond and \$300,000 residential liability insurance.

THE RECENT RAINFALL HAS BEEN NICE; HOWEVER THE RAIN ALSO INCREASES THE MOSQUITO POPULATION. WE WILL BE PRE-TREATING AND FOGGING FOR MOSQUITOS PERIODICALLY TO HELP CONTROL THE POPULATION. AS HOMEOWNERS, YOU CAN HELP BY KEEPING GRASS MOWED DOWN, AVOID OVER WATERING THE LAWN, AND ELIMINATING SMALL POOLS OF WATER AROUND THE HOME. ALSO COMPANIES LIKE PROCHEM AND PANHANDLE GREENHOUSE OFFER SEVERAL SAFE PRODUCTS THAT CAN BE APPLIED AROUND THE HOME TO HELP WITH MOSQUITOS.

REMINDER - THE DUMP IS FOR TREE LIMBS, BRUSH, CATTAILS, AND GRASS CLIPPINGS ONLY. PLEASE DO NOT DUMP LUMBER, CROSS TIES, AND HOUSE HOLD TRASH.

ALSO, THE TRASH CANS AROUND THE FUEL PUMPS, PARK, AND BOAT RAMPS ARE INTENDED FOR USE IN THOSE AREAS AND NOT FOR PERSONAL HOUSEHOLD TRASH. THERE ARE TRASH COMPANIES AVAILABLE TO PICK UP RESIDENTIAL TRASH.
