Welcome to May! I hope everyone enjoyed a happy and blessed Easter.

We had a great turn out and a lot of fun on our first official Bingo Night. We had right at 92 people participate, and I hope everyone had a good time. A spring cleaning day has been scheduled for May 20th. There will be a document shredding truck at the community center parking lot from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. provided by Don Carver's company, UCI, for the residents to utilize; and there will also be two dumpsters provided by LSIOT for member use. This **will not be** a lake clean up event, so we will not be pulling anything out of the lake or picking up debris on road sides. By not charging sales tax on dues, this saves each member about \$11 per month. Ballots will also be available at the Corporation office. **Please vote.**

They should be in within a few weeks, and at that time the fuel pumps will be temporarily out of service for three to four days during installation. FICTION

THE FIX (*David Baldacci*) Amos Decker witnesses a murder just outside FBI headquarters. A man shoots a woman execution-style and then turns the gun on himself. Even with Decker's extraordinary powers of observation and deduction, the case is baffling. The Defense Intelligence Agency believes solving the case is now a matter of urgent national security and orders Decker to back off. But Decker has never been one to follow the rules.

THE WRONG SIDE OF GOODBYE (*Michael Connelly*) An aging billionaire hires part-time detective Harry Bosch to find out if there is an heir to his vast fortune. When he was 18 his pregnant Mexican girlfriend mysteriously disappeared. As Harry begins to uncover her tragic story, he finds uncanny links to his own past and knows he cannot rest until he finds the truth.

SONG OF THE LION (*Anne Hillerman*) When a car bomb kills a young man in the Shiprock High School parking lot, Officer Bernadette Manuelito discovers that the intended victim was a mediator for a multi-million-dollar development planned at the Grand Canyon. But what seems like an act of ecoterrorism turns out to be something far more nefarious and complex. Piecing together the clues, Bernadette and her husband, Sergeant Jim Chee, make a disturbing discovery—a meticulous and very patient killer with a long-simmering plan of revenge.

SILVER LININGS (*Debbie Macomber*) Since opening the Rose Harbor Inn, Jo Marie Rose has met fascinating people from all walks of life, but none have piqued her interest quite like handyman Mark Taylor. Jo Marie and Mark are good friends—and are becoming something more—yet he still won't reveal anything about his past. When Mark tells her that he's moving out of town, Jo Marie is baffled. Just when she is starting to open herself up again to love, she feels once more that she is losing the man she cares about. As she grapples with Mark's decision and tries to convince him to stay, she welcomes two visitors also seeking their own answers.

THE TEA GIRL OF HUMMINGBIRD LANE (*Lisa See*) Li-yan and her family align their lives around the seasons and the farming of tea. There is ritual and routine, and it has been ever thus for generations. Then one day a jeep appears at the village gate – the first automobile any of them have seen – and a stranger arrives. In this remote Yunnan village, the stranger finds the rare tea he has been seeking and a reticent Akha people. Li-yan, one of the few educated girls on her mountain, translates for the stranger and is among the first to reject the rules that have shaped her existence.

THE NIGHT THE LIGHTS WENT OUT (*Karen White*) Merilee, a young single mother, discovers that there's no such thing as the perfect neighbor when she moves to the Atlanta suburb of Sweet Apple, Georgia. In a town like Sweet Apple, where sins and secrets are as likely to be found behind the walls of gated mansions as in the dark woods surrounding Merilee's house, finding out who your true friends are is the most important lesson of all.

KILLERS OF THE FLOWER MOON (*David Grann*) In the 1920s, the richest people per capita in the world were members of the Osage Indian Nation in Oklahoma. After oil was discovered beneath their land, the Osage lived lives of opulence and luxury. Then, one by one, they began to be killed off. As the death toll climbed to more than twenty-four, the FBI took up the case, and together with the Osage they began to expose one of the most monstrous conspiracies in American history.

THE AMERICAN SPIRIT (*David McCullough*) A timely collection of speeches by the most honored historian in the United States. Now, at a time of self-reflection in America following a bitter election campaign that has left the country divided, he reminds us of core American values to which we all subscribe—regardless of where we live, our political party affiliation, or our ethnic background—and helps to guide us as we find our way forward.

THE 1997 MASTERS (*Tiger Woods*) To mark the 20th anniversary of his historic win at the 1997 Masters, Tiger Woods will for the first time reflect on the record-setting win both on and off the course. In 1997, Tiger Woods was already among the most-watched and closely examined athletes in history. But it wasn't until the Masters Tournament that his career would definitively change forever. Woods, then only 21, won the Masters by a historic 12 shots, which remains the widest margin of victory in the tournament's history, making it an iconic moment both for him and for sports.

Village Notes

The time has arrived for my last *Village Notes* as your mayor. This time next month we will have a new mayor and some new aldermen.

Wildfire

As many of you are aware, the village dodged a wildfire bullet the evening of April 19th. At approximately 8:30PM on Wednesday evening a report of a fire along the atv trail behind the golf course was called in to Randall County. The Lake Tanglewood VFD had a fast response and quickly had the fire under control, limiting it to about an acre.

I said we “dodged a bullet” because the fire was reported while still small in area and the wind was fairly calm. Because of the rough terrain and restricted access, had the fire grown in size before being reported and/or the wind been as strong as it was during the day the situation would have been entirely different. Depending on the wind speed and direction there would have been a serious threat to either Lake Tanglewood (and possibly Palisades and Timbercreek), houses bordering the golf course or River Falls.

Although the exact cause of the fire is unknown, we do know it was not caused by lightning or power lines. It was caused by some sort of human action. Possible causes are a tossed cigarette, spark (or other source) from an atv, illegal fireworks or other personal action. It only takes one spark to start a tragic wildfire.

I encourage all of our residents to be especially mindful of the fire danger we live with every day. Insure your atvs and dirt bikes are in top mechanical condition. If you smoke, don't discard your cigarette, cigar or ashes carelessly. Those who served in the military may remember how to field strip your cigarette. Please emphasize with your children (including teens) the importance of wildfire safety. It was only six years ago the village experienced its second tragic wildfire. Don't forget, village ordinances prohibit open fires of any kind (except in specially constructed patio fire pits) without a approval from the fire department.

Warning Siren Update

This has been a learning experience for me, as the process is taking longer than I anticipated. The contract with Federal Signal is signed and the components are on order. The last component to arrive will probably be the concrete poles. Once everything is on hand the project should progress fairly quickly. My fingers are

crossed the system will be fully integrated with the Amarillo system and operational by the end of June.
